



# Pupil Premium Use at Barnston



Pupil premium money is the extra money that schools receive from the government for Looked After Children (4 children 1.5%), Armed Forces children (0) and for Free School Meals children (10 children – 3.7%).

Barnston primary school received £10 700 and this money is used to enhance children's learning in the following areas:

A dedicated Teaching Assistant level 2 every morning who works with children in small group interventions (wave 2 and 3) in 6-8 week blocks of which there are LAC and FSM children in the groups. (6 children). £6,853.

Two teaching assistants (1 afternoon per week - £1747.88 to receive accredited training for Seasons of Growth and the cost of running the 8 sessions and the resources needed – a bereavement and loss programme aimed at bereaved, LAC (4 so far), children who need this as a part of their Team Around the Child (1) and children whose parents have split up, or have struggled with loss of physical use of the part of the body (2) FSM children (6). - £410. (A total of 36 children have accessed this programme in the last 2 years).

LAC have paid residential trips and other trips out are paid for out of pupil premium money. This is a year 3 sleepover £10/child, a year 4 residential £130/half a week/child and a year 6 residential £360/week/child (4 LAC – 1 in Yr 2, 1 in Yr 4, 1 yr 5 and 1 in yr 6) - £490 total.

Trips and visits/visitors in school – see our events for the year on the VLE this is covered for all 4 LAC - £800/year (10% increase this year).

Extra curricular clubs for LAC, FSM children provided by the school - £800.

Total £11,100 (400 over as period 6 of the budget shows for 2012).

## **Impact on the Children**

Barnston data shows that the above is having an impact on the children who come under the umbrella of Pupil Premium – we as a school are dedicated to putting more provision in than the Pupil Premium money allows, to ensure that our children attain and achieve the expected level of progress or beyond (see current SATs results on VLE). We see intervention waves as an important tool for all children to keep them on track and are also committed to the emotional well being of the children, using PSHE and circle times, alongside Seasons of Growth to remove any barriers to their learning. Our Raiseonline data shows that we are narrowing the gap for our LAC, FSM and Armed Forces children (taken from LA data sent out prior to 2011/12 Raiseonline – out Nov 2012). Over 50% of our LAC and FSM children are exceeding their expected level of progress.
